

### Meet the Member, Lou Demko, W3LPR



Growing up in Allentown, Pennsylvania, my first experience with shortwave radio started with a case of TVI in 1956, which my next door neighbor was generating from his basement. After inquiring how he accomplished that, we ended up punching a hole through our adjacent basement wall to install a wire so we could practice Morse code with the J-38 key he gave me which I have to this day.

In 1957 I was licensed as a novice with WN3LPR, which was upgraded to General the following year as W3LPR and eventually to Advanced and Extra. My equipment at the time was a Heathkit AR-3 receiver and a Heathkit DX-35 which was traded for a used DX-100 and a Hallicrafters SX-99. Enjoying construction projects so much, some Heathkits were assembled for friends just for the pleasure of it. I was a member of the Lehigh Valley ARC, station W3OI. I pedaled a bicycle to and from meetings every Friday night at the Civil Defense building

Based on the electronics exposure I received as an amateur radio operator, my first job out of high school was as a Semiconductor Diffusion Furnace technician in the Bell Telephone Labs building Bipolar Transistor devices. There I met

my first big time Tektronix oscilloscope, a version of which I bought at the Deerfield, New Hampshire hamfest 30 years later. My 1958 Chevy Impala was turned into a mobile with the building and installation of the Heathkit MR-1 and MT-1 mobile twins which are now relegated to attic storage.

After transferring from Bell Labs to Western Electric for a few years as a Quality Assurance technician, I took the money saved for a used Corvette and wisely applied it toward tuition at Penn State University receiving a B.S. Degree in Industrial Engineering in 1967 and marrying my wife Sheila, also a PSU grad. We have been college sweet hearts for over 50 years now, with two sons living out of state and a daughter in Greenville.

After college I worked again at Western Electric as an Engineer on their Nike Zeus beam leaded semiconductor line. A transfer was made to a major semiconductor manufacturer in Essex Junction, Vermont for 22 years as a Software Developer with a brief sojourn to a Manassas, Virginia semiconductor plant.

Moving to Wilson in 1993, I worked as a Software Systems Engineer at Export Leaf Tobacco and retired in 2004. I now have more time for occasional contesting on SSB and CW, running and working out at the gym. The current equipment lineup consists of an ICOM 751 purchased new 30 years ago that serves as backup to a FlexRadio 6300. The Flex feeds an end fed 127 foot long wire antenna on HF and a WA3UTC-built 6 meter Moxon. I am running an old ICOM IC-27A on 2 meters and a recently purchased Alinco DR-



Some of those that earned the General and Amateur Extra licenses passed were upgrades or they took the earlier exams at the same session. One, Alvan J. LaRocque, **KX4ND**, took all three exams to received his Amateur Extra license.

Congratulations to all for the outstanding accomplishments.

### **QSL Cards**

Five 5 by 7 envelopes arrived a few days ago with no return address. It was from the W4 QSL Bureau with over 120 QSL cards. Over 100 were for the ARRL Centennial QSO Party. Other were for DX stations. One interesting one was from the South Cook Islands. I made the contact on 10 meters just before 3 PM EST. I think that's the longest time between working a DX station and receiving a QSL card.

But the record goes to **K4KBB**. We worked each other using SSB on 75 meters on December 1957 and exchanged QSL cards in June 2001, 43 years later! We had a 20 minute QSO for 30 minutes starting at 1:20 AM. He was in Bishopville, SC and I was in Raleigh.

I don't know what rig he was using. I was using a Collins 75A-4 receiver and a Hallicrafters HT-32 transmitter driving a homebrew pair of 813s to 750 watts. The amplifier I converted had 813 tubes push-pull class C on AM. When I went to SSB, I rebuilt the amplifier to grounded grid parallel 813s, I later sold it to K4QDQ (SK) and he sold it to Bert Bailey, W4FMN(SK). Bert put it in operation at the club station at Wake Technical south of Raleigh. Guess it's long gone now. The amplifier was originally a single 813 that I built in 1953 while in high school. A week later I rebuilt it to a push-pull 813 amp to help reduce TVI. The first one wiped out TV

two blocks away. I know that because one of my HS Senior classmates called me and he was a little upset when he heard my voice on his TV! We could only get Channel 4 in Norfolk, mostly snowy, about 110 miles away.


### W1AW QSL Cards

In 2014, the ARRL celebrated their 100th anniversary by having the ARRL Centennial QSO Party. **W1AW** operated from every state two times during the year. Each week, 2 states operated using **W1AW**/n. Of course North Carolina used W4AW/4. Each week, 2 states would operated so they were on for another week some months later.

I was lucky enough to work W1AW in all 50 states both weeks, Washington, DC and 5 territories, Guantanamo Bay, Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, American Samao and Puerto Rico. I received QSL cards for all states and Washington, DC and the territories. I may have a couple more cards coming later. I'm only missing the 2nd week for CT and RI. The contacts are confirmed on LOTW.

I contacted **W1AW** 982 times in 2014 and 936 were confirmed on Logbook Of The World All states were confirmed several times for both weeks It's going to take a while to enter the QSL cards in my logging program. Some states had as many as 10 contacts on a card. Modes used were SSB, CW, RTTY and PSK31.

### National Weather Service Dropping High Seas and Storm Warnings on WWV/WWVH

(NWS) is discontinuing its high seas and vide weather information in various for- weather information through the NIST frestorm warnings transmitted via National Institute of Science and Technology (NIST) WWV/WWVH time and frequency-standard HF transmissions, starting January 31 at 1800 UTC. The NWS warnings are aimed at the Atlantic, the Gulf of Mexico, and the Pacific.

"This service is being terminated because weather information in the current broadcast format does not support frequent-enough updates for changes in marine weather and cannot provide enough detail in the allotted window required by mariners to avoid hazardous weather," NWS said in announcing the discontinuation. "Additionally, alternative technolo-

quency signals."

The NWS said other sources of marine weather information, high seas alerts, and detailed forecasts are available over satellite, telephone, the internet, marine fax, radio fax, and VHF radio. The NWS, US Coast Guard, and US Navy provide multiple dissemination methods for storm positioning, high sea areas, observations, forecasts, outlooks, and warnings for both coastal and oceanic marine zones near the US, all through a variety of technologies, including NAVTEX and the Global Maritime Distress and Safety System (GMDSS).





## OPDX Bulletin Mailing List is Victim of Hamnet.org Server Hack

The Ohio/Penn DX (OPDX) Bulletin mailing list is reported to be "in limbo" after a January 11 hack of the Hamnet.org server. OPDX Bulletin Editor Tedd Mirgliotta, KB8NW, reports that the server, which he'd used since the late 1980s, was "hacked and wiped" on January 11. The OPDX Bulletin mailing list was among the casualties. "The OPDX mailing list is now in limbo, and I was told that the server Hamnet.org is probably is gone for good," Mirgliotta said in the bulletin's January 14 edition. He said the OPDX Bulletin, including an archive of back issues, remains available on the OPDX website.



### RTTY and FT8 Successfully Coexist in 2019 ARRL RTTY Roundup

Based on informal polling and log-submission trends, it appears that RTTY and FT8 successfully shared spectrum during the ARRL RTTY Roundup over the January 5 – 6 weekend. The event is seeing a dramatic uptick from last year in the number of logs submitted, with more than 2,400 and counting received by midweek, as opposed to 1,622 in the 2018 running. ARRL Contest Branch Manager Bart Jahnke, W9JJ, is urging everyone who participated in the 2019 RTTY Roundup to turn in a log — no matter the number of contacts made. Logs for the 2019 RTTY Roundup are due by Sunday, January 13, at 2359 UTC, and may be uploaded via the ARRL website (or see mailing instructions for paper logs).

"The 30th running of the ARRL RTTY Roundup is now in the books," Jahnke said. "All indications are that the event — in both RTTY and other digital categories gained significant additional attention and increased popularity with the inclusion of FT8 in the digital line up." Jahnke said the digital operating experience gained through the RTTY Roundup should benefit participants in the upcoming ARRL January VHF Contest and in future VHF contests, where WSJT-X protocols such as JTx, MSK144, Grifton-146.685-88.5 tone and FT8 continue to gain popularity as a means to work hard-to-reach grids beyond the usual 400-mile tropo-scatter range, and for slower activity periods.

Jahnke reminds those submitting RTTY Roundup logs to make sure they're entering in the correct category. All entries that made contacts in FT8 or PSKxx (with their multi-channel decoder technology) must enter in one of the Unlimited categories, unless they're Multioperator entries. Contact the ARRL Contest Branch with any questions.

The inclusion of FT8 for the first time in the RTTY Roundup had generated considerable pre-contest debate, but when all was said and done, most stations tended to operate one mode or the other, although a few utilized both (and perhaps other digital modes), judging from logs posted on the 3830scores website. The RTTY Roundup came close on the heels of the inaugural FT8 Roundup over the first weekend in December, which was deemed a success (it was the first-ever contest for the winner only licensed for 2 years — and for one other Top 10 finisher). via ARRL.ORG 1/10/2019
