## From ARRL:

#### Payroll Tax Bill Includes Provision for Amateur Radio Study

02/17/2012

A bill that passed both the House and the Senate today includes a provision for a study of the uses and capabilities of Amateur Radio Service communications in emergencies and disaster relief.

If passed into law, Section 6414 (see below for text) of the Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act of 2012 mandates the completion of the study, with a report of the findings to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce and the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation. This study would "use the expertise of stakeholder entities and organizations" to recommend how to best use radio amateurs in emergency communications and disaster relief efforts, and how to best utilize the Amateur Radio Service in coordination with the federal government in these efforts. In addition, the study would also discuss the effects of unreasonable or unnecessary private land use restrictions on residential antenna installations and recommend ways to remove such impediments.

The bill passed the House with a 293-132 victory. In the Senate, it passed by a 60-36 vote. According to the <u>Los Angeles Times</u>, President Obama is expected to sign the bill "quickly." Section 6414: Study on Emergency Communications by Amateur Radio and Impediments to Amateur Radio Communications

- (a) In General: Not later than 180 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Commission [FCC], in consultation with the Office of Emergency Communications in the
  Department of Homeland Security, shall:
  - o (1) complete a study on the uses and capabilities of Amateur Radio Service communications in emergencies and disaster relief; and
  - (2) submit to the Committee on Energy and Commerce of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation of the Senate a report on the findings of such study.
- (b) Contents: The study required by subsection (a) shall include:
  - (1)(A) a review of the importance of emergency Amateur Radio Service communications relating to disasters, severe weather, and other threats to lives and property in the United States; and
    - (B) recommendations for:
      - (i) enhancements in the voluntary deployment of Amateur Radio operators in disaster and emergency communications and disaster relief efforts; and
      - (ii) improved integration of Amateur Radio operators in the planning and furtherance of initiatives of the Federal Government; and
  - (2)(A) an identification of impediments to enhanced Amateur Radio Service communications, such as the effects of unreasonable or unnecessary private land
    use restrictions on residential antenna installations; and
    - (B) recommendations regarding the removal of such impediments.
- (c) Expertise: In conducting the study required by subsection (a), the Commission shall use the expertise of stakeholder entities and organizations, including the Amateur Radio, emergency response, and disaster communications communities.

#### **W1AW Gets New Antennas**

The freak snow storm in late October wreaked havoc on the ARRL HQ antenna farm. According to W1AW Station Manager Joe Carcia, NJ1Q, both of W1AW's M-Squared 40 meter Yagis were severely damaged, as was the 80 meter cage antenna, and an element on the north tower's 10 meter Yagi was twisted vertically. The antennas atop the ARRL Headquarters building for W1HQ, the station for the Laird Campbell Memorial HQ Operators Club, also received damage: the Gap Titan vertical was turned into something that looked like a pretzel, and the Pro-Sis-Tel rotator was also damaged.

"Until we could get these antennas replaced, we had some temporary fixes so we could still send out the bulletins and provide a station for our visitors," Carcia explained. "For 40 meters, I homebrewed a 'fat dipole,' and for 80 meters, I strung a simple dipole off the north tower."

Matt Strelow, KC1XX, and Andrew Toth of XX Towers came to Newington earlier this week to replace most of the damaged items. Together with Carcia, they removed the damaged 80 meter wire cage antenna and repaired the element on the 10 meter Yagi on the north tower. They also removed the two damaged 40 meter Yagis on the center tower (a 120 foot Rohn 65 tower) and replaced them with two new Cushcraft XM240 40 meter Yagi antennas. For W1HQ, they replaced the damaged rotator with a new Yaesu G-1000DXA rotator. Before Strelow and Toth arrived, Carcia had already assembled both of the new 40 meter Yagis and prepared the new W1HQ rotator and its control cable.

"Matt and Andrew normally perform inspections for W1AW and W1HQ twice a year in the spring and autumn," Carcia said. "They were here for two days installing the new antennas, but they did not perform any inspections. They'll come back in the spring for that."

In the early spring, Carcia will replace the Gap Titan that used to be on top of the ARRL HQ building with a vertical antenna that SteppIR has donated to W1HQ.

## Hollywood Movie Features Morse Code, Homebrew Equipment -- and Sea Monsters!



In the movie <u>Journey 2: The Mysterious Island</u>, Sean Anderson (played by Josh Hutcherson) receives a coded distress signal that comes from a mysterious island where no island should exist. Sean decides to follow the signal with the unwilling assistance from his stepfather Hank (played by Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson).

The movie opens in Dayton, Óhio with Sean on his motorcycle, being chased by police officers. Sean had been caught breaking in to a "satellite facility." When questioned by Hank, Sean confesses that he had received a coded message from his grandfather (played by Michael Caine), but his equipment was too weak to copy it, he decided to go somewhere where there were bigger antennas. The message -- a string of one and two syllable words taken from the books by Jules Verne -- makes no sense to Sean. Hank, a former US Navy cryptographer, offers to help decode the message; he feels this will be a good chance to bond with his stepson.

Immediately, Hank figures out that the message is really in Morse code: each one syllable word is a "dah." Hank translates the message, which gives clues to the location of the grandfather's whereabouts.

Sean explains to Hank why he wants to hunt down the signal: "A few nights ago, a radio signal got sent out from these coordinates. It could be the mysterious island that Jules Verne wrote about."

Hank replies: "You think you're gonna travel halfway around the world and meet up with some lunatic who's messing around on a ham radio?" "That's not some lunatic," Sean says. "That's my grandfather."

This scene takes place at Sean's desk in his bedroom. There are various pieces of radio gear -- such as a Kenwood TS-450s transceiver, an Ameritron AL-80 linear amplifier, an ICOM IC-28A 2 meter transceiver, an MFJ 949E antenna tuner, a Lowe HF-150 receiver, a microphone and books on radio dating from the 1930s -- on the desk; when Sean's house is shown from the street, however, no antennas are visible. Behind the desk are posters from Jules Verne works, as well as maps -- including <u>The Radio Amateur's World Map</u> from Yaesu -- and QSL cards on the bulletin board behind the desk.

One of these QSL cards belongs to Ned Conklin, KH7JJ, of Honolulu, Hawaii. Conklin is the President of the Battleship *Missouri* Amateur Radio Club, KH6BB. "The movie people contacted Joe Speroni, AH0A, looking to borrow radio gear for the movie," Conklin told the ARRL. "He didn't know anyone who had equipment they could loan, so he contacted me to see if the *Missouri* had any. We provided him with some gear, as well as some beautiful QSL cards that we had received from hams in the South Pacific. They shot the scene with the radios here in Hawaii, but the movie people asked if they could take the equipment to North Carolina in case they had to use it again."

Through the clues in the coded message, Sean and Hank learn that Sean's grandfather is on an island off the coast of Palau, located about 500 miles east of the Philippines. The two go to Palau, in hopes that they can charter someone to take them to the island where they believe Sean's grandfather to be. There, they meet up with Gabato (a helicopter pilot played by Luis Guzman) and his daughter Kailani (played by Vanessa Hudgens). The group makes their way to the island and finds the grandfather, who takes them to the hut that he has built out of the boat that brought him to the island.

The grandfather explains that he was glad Sean was able to receive and decipher his message. He said he built his radio in three months "out of an alarm clock, copper wire and a teaspoon." When the others tell him that they should get on the radio and call for help, the grandfather says that would be a good thing, but "you have to wait for the communications satellite to come around into the proper position." When asked when the next time would be, the grandfather says "Oh, about two weeks." After this scene, radio is never mentioned again.

Eventually, the five get off the island in a most unique way, with Sean and Hank returning to Dayton. Kailani also ends up at Dayton as a student at the University of Dayton. Thanks to the remarkable way the group escapes the island, Gabato's fortune is made and he expands his tour business. And the grandfather? He's ready to set off on another adventure.

"We appreciate being asked to be a part of Journey 2: The Mysterious Island," Conklin told the ARRL. "It is always thrilling to see Amateur Radio in popular culture, and hopefully young people will feel the excitement and want to explore the magic of radio."





# 12 Who Care: Bob Sholl

SHERMAN, TX -- This week's 12 Who Care nominee is a Texoma man who works behind the scenes coordinating volunteers during emergencies. Even though he's retired, he refuses to take it easy, and still spends most of his time helping others.

Bob Sholl was just a child when the Great Depression hit, but he watched it's effects ripple throughout the community in the years that followed.

"Family had to take care of family and families had to take care of friends and neighbors took care of neighbors and that was the environment I was raised in," Sholl said. And it's the way he's lived his life ever since.

"It's just been instilled in us all of our lives," Sholl said. "If you have a talent and you have the opportunity to help others, you go ahead and you do it."

Sholl is an Air Force veteran. He's been an amateur radio operator since 1952. He's a member of the Grayson County Amateur Radio Club and Amateur Radio Emergency Services

Group. He Joined the Texoma Composite Squadron of Civil Air Patrol in 1970 and eventually won the Gil Robb Wilson Award. He was a minister for several decades. The list goes on and on. Sholl retired from the Federal Aviation Administration, but those who know him say he works harder as a retiree than many people do in their careers.

"He works through elections. He works through his church. He works with us here in emergency management. He works through civil air patrol. He works through amateur radio. He is always on the move. He's an example to people like us," said Sarah Somers, Grayson County Emergency Manager.

So, his friends and fellow volunteers wanted to show Bob Sholl how much they appreciate all he has done, and is doing.

"What's going on?

"Well your colleagues have turned you name in to KXII 12 Who Care Program, and we'd just like to let you know that you're being recognized for your volunteer service to the community and we appreciate you. So, let's give Bob a round of applause."

While Sholl is humbled by the recognition, he says tomorrow is just another day full of opportunities to make a difference in the lives of others.

"It's just a feeling within you, it's a desire," Sholl said. "And, it's always there when you get up in the morning when you get ready to go to bed at night you think — what am I going to do tomorrow? Who am I going to help? Where am I going to be needed?"


The next meeting will be April 10<sup>th</sup> at the Jefferson County Clubhouse following the JCARC meeting.
