that we didn't offer free rides, but that ... for a limited time only ... I could SELL him a slightly used ... "Official SAG Wagon" for a special, reduced, Gusher Marathon price. That's about the time that L.B and the nice police officer ... "Official SAG walked up, and I had to change my story pretty quickly.

Actually, there were a couple of incidents that required a medical evaluation ... and also a few other times when it was a matter of leg cramps or exhaustion. In all cases, the "hams"at the various Water Station / Rest Stops, did a great job of notifying "Net Control" that either a SAG Wagon or medical personnel were needed. That, along with the "hams" who were on patrol, driving the SAG vehicles in their assigned zones ... all made it a much safer and smoother event

Rocky (N5MTX) and I were discussing how, if someone in a biking or running event seems to be really struggling ... it's not a bad idea for one of our "ham" operators to go ask that person if they need a ride ... or any other kind of assistance. It's possible that your offer might be what helps them to realize that they need to stop, and that forcing themselves further is perhaps not the thing to do. What at that point might be a case of being really tired and worn out ... could turn into something much more serious if they keep pushing too hard ... especially if they haven't trained up to that intensity level yet. Of course the decision is up to them. In my case, if I were going to bike or run in one of these events, I would probably ask for a ride at

the starting line. I mean ... why tempt fate? This year, Tom (KF5FIE) rode his bicycle behind the last runners, and became our "bike turtle". He had his APRS system on, (Automatic Packet Reporting System) and we were able to track his location at all times ... along with his radio transmissions as to the status of the runners he was following. That worked out really well, and the added visual tracking was really groovy. ("Groovy" being a term often

used by old hippie types who grew up in the 1960's .. or so I've been told anyway. Not that I would actually know first hand.)

There were several special runners this year. Some I got photos of ... and some I was not able to because I was either on the radio, or taking a nap when they went by. There was a mom who had her baby strapped to her while she ran ... and the guy who carried a large, and heavy American flag through the whole course .. and an inspiring story of a dad who is fighting a difficult illness, but pushed his daughter in a stroller through the entire course, and He said he wanted it noted that she came in first ... and he came in second. won

"HAM HAPPENINGS" Richard ... KA5IQX BIG THICKET BIKE TOUR ... MAR. 16, 2013

The weather was fantastic for the Big Thicket Bike Tour ... except for the wind. Early morning started out rather chilly and damp, but as the sun came up, it began to warm up nicely. High wind warnings had been issued, but as Rich and I were setting up our equipment at Rest Stop 3 ... there was only a nice breeze, and nothing so brisk as to cause us concern. So ... we set up our table, along with some large tripod supports and heavy base sections to be used with our portable masts. We mounted our antennas to the masts, and up they went. As a final touch, we even attached our colorful umbrellas to the table to give us some shade and brighten up what had now become the official "Radio Central" area of downtown Fred, Texas. Of course it should be noted that each time we use those umbrellas, Tootie (KCSHVT) always says our station looks like an ice cream stand.

Anyway ... things were going well, and we were performing our assigned communications duties at Station 3 ... when suddenly, a huge gust of wind (Which Rich and I estimated at approximately 127 miles per hour) came down upon us ... knocking over tables ... blowing umbrellas away like a re-run of "Mary Poppins" or "The Flying Nun" ... and toppling masts and antennas in the blink of an eye. In short ... We wuz zapped. As we stood there in complete shock ... viewing the rubble of what had only moments ago been our super-cool, "A-Team" Rest Stop ... it was obvious that we needed to do something quickly in order to recover. So ... we took a break and had a couple of apple fritters ... which calmed our frazzled nerves. Having been rejuvenated, we then put everything back up (with sand bags added this time, for extra weight) ... except for the umbrellas. Putting the umbrellas up again would have been useless considering the increased winds. And besides ... they didn't look much like umbrellas anymore. More like bedsheets that had been ripped off of a clothesline by the neighborhood dog, and dragged through a cactus garden.

But ... we survived, and got everything up and running again, and that included starting once more on some experimentation we had been doing with the idea of portable digi-peating for APRS. (Which ... depending on the source, stands for either "All Purpose Radio Scrambler" .. or "Automatic Position Reporting System".) I think it's the second one) Anyway, I was attempting to send a beacon to Bennie (KE5RTI) at Station 1 ... to see if his Kenwood 710a would be able to digi-peat that beacon to an I-Gate at Rich's house, south of Kountz. Dave (K5DDM) even drove down from Call, Texas to give us some help in that effort ... and showed up wearing a tin foil hat that he was convinced would help intensify the digital radio signals being sent to Bennie, and therefore would help in completing the digi-peat through the I-Gate, and onto the internet. It seemed like a stretch to me, but what the heck.

So ... to make a long story longer, while I was busy maintaining contact with net control ... changing a tire for one of the bike riders, and saving a small child from drowning ... I saw Dave was now wearing the tin foil hat like a pirate, and he and Rich were sword fighting using their mag-mount antennas. At first I was a bit upset since I was working so hard, while they were playing "Pirates From The MotherShip" ... but then I noticed that each time they crossed swords (antennas) there were some sparks being emitted from the tin foil hat on Dave's head.

I'm not really sure what that had to do with the experiment, but somehow it must have had a positive effect ... because in the end, we were successful in the effort ... and my beacon signal actually was repeated by Bennie's radio and transmitted to the I-Gate just as we wanted it to do. The fact that doorbells were ringing and garage doors were opening within a 6-mile radius is something we'll have to address in the future, but for right now we're just happy that it worked at all.

After the last group of riders went through Rest Stop 3 ... I saddled up "Old Paint" (Otherwise known as my "Communications and Command" vehicle)and hit the highway for some "SAG" duties. I followed behind a few of the last bike riders and ended up assuming the "turtle" position behind the very last rider on the northern route. He later decided that he had reached hislimit on endurance, and I ended up giving him and his bike a ride back to the "start-finish" line. I was going to leave his bike on the side of the road, since he wasn't using it anymore ... but he insisted that I bring it along.

During this process I was able to drop in on Rest Stop 4 ... but it wasn't quite what I expected to find. As I drove up, I thought I would see lots of masts and antennas, with a bank of batteries and solar panels ... along with a couple of generators humming in the background ... and a long table with several "ham" operators busy making transmissions. Nope. That's not what I saw. Instead, I found four ops ... leaned back in their easy chairs ... two of them taking a nap... one sipping on some iced tea (or that's what they said it was) and the last one holding a hand-held ... trying to decide whether to turn it on or not. I told them that the scene reminded me of the porch area of a "Cracker Barrel" restaurant. It looked like they were waiting on a table.

But hey ... it was a fun day, and several of the bike riders thanked us for our assistance, and really appreciated us making their bike tour a little safer and easier for them. As usual, there are more events coming up, so you will be needed. When the opportunity arises, be sure to take advantage of it, and volunteer to - "ham it up".

ARRL in Action: What Have We Been Up to Lately?

This feature -- including convenient Web links to useful information -- is a concise monthly update of some of the things ARRL is doing on behalf of its members. This installment covers the month of February.

Packets for the 2013 ARRL Field Day are now available.

The International Telecommunication Union is offering a **free download** of its International Radio Regulations.

The Universal Postal Union introduced a new International Reply Coupon that is valid July 2013-December 2017.

NASA announced it was accepting proposals to host an ARISS contact with astronauts aboard the International Space Station.

The ARRL solicited suggestions for a new IARU Region 2 HF band plan.

Three new "how to" videos were **posted** on the ARRL website.

The **results** of the ARRL spring Section Manager elections were announced.

The American Red Cross announced that it will phase out its Emergency Communications Response Vehicles.

Development Update: The ARRL Development Office will recognize almost 4000 members this year who have reached membership milestones of 40, 50, 60, 70 and 80 years. Members who reach these milestones receive a certificate and a pin. ARRL Individual Giving Manager Lauren Clarke, KB1YDD, reported that the <u>ARRL</u> <u>Diamond Club</u> is at 13 percent of its 2013 goal (176 donors), the <u>Spectrum Defense Fund</u> is at 6 percent of its goal (173 donors) and the <u>Education & Technology</u> <u>Fund</u> is at 8 percent of its goal (23 donors). Click <u>here</u> to make your contribution to the fund of your choice.

The ARRL Foundation received 212 scholarship applications for the more than 80 scholarships it administers. The Foundation's Board of Directors is reviewing these applications and awards will be announced in May.

ARRL Lab Test Engineer Bob Allison, WB1GCM, completed testing of a legal limit HF and 6 meter RF amplifier. Afterwards, he used the amplifier as an RF source for testing a 30/300/3000 W power meter.

ARRL Chief Executive Officer Harold Kramer, WJ1B, received the Bringing It Home Award from the Connecticut Convention and Sports Bureau for booking the 2014 ARRL National Convention at the Connecticut Convention Center.

DXCC Desk: Three current operations -- 5X8C in Uganda (commencing in 2012) and the T6TJ (commencing in 2012) and T6BP (commencing in 2011) operations in Afghanistan --were approved for DXCC credit.

A new **Quick Stats Poll** was posted to the ARRL website.

The winners of the February QST Cover Plaque award were John White, VA7JW, and Ken Tapping for their article "The Penticton Solar Flux Receiver."

The March print issue of <u>OST</u> and the March/April issue of <u>OEX</u> and <u>NCJ</u> were released to the printer and the digital edition was released to the digital publisher. The <u>March digital edition of OST</u> was made available to ARRL members. Three new books -- *Ham Radio for Arduino and PICAXE*, *Radio Science for the Radio Amateur* and *The ARRL Repeater Directory 2013-2014* (both pocket and desktop) -- were also released to the printer.

Official Observer Desk: ARRL Field and Regulatory Correspondent Chuck Skolaut, K0BOG, handled complaints concerning hams operating in the Free Band segment between the amateur portion on 10 meters and the Citizens Band portion on 11 meters, repeater jamming, carriers reported on 3.920 MHz and a Citizens Band operator causing interference on 10 meters. He also answered questions concerning operating IRLP control, proper identification when using *JT65*, amateur transmissions, operating overseas and operating on 3.840 and 14.313 MHz.

Member Contact: ARRL Regulatory Information Branch Manager Dan Henderson, N1ND, attended the ARRL Arizona State Convention in Yuma, Arizona; ARRL Chief Operating Officer Harold Kramer, WJ1B, and ARRL Marketing Manager Bob Inderbitzen, NQ1R, attended the ARRL Southeastern Division Convention in Orlando, Florida.

Ham Radio in Hollywood: Last Man Standing to Feature Amateur Radio Storyline

In an episode tentatively scheduled to air Friday, March 15, the hit ABC comedy *Last Man Standing* -- starring Tim Allen as Mike Baxter, KA0XTT -- will <u>feature a secondary ham radio storyline</u>. This is the first time that the show will highlight Amateur Radio in its plot, showing various cast members on the air and communicating via ham radio.

In Episode 217 -- called "The Fight" -- Mike's daughter Mandy (played by Molly Ephraim), gets her cell phone taken away as punishment. She discovers Mike's home shack in the basement and uses ham radio to make faraway friends. According to *Last Man Standing* Producer John Amodeo, NN6JA, the home shack is a brand new set built just for this episode. The ARRL provided many of the awards and certificates -- including 5 Band DXCC, 5 Band Worked All States, 5 Band Worked All Continents, VUCC (for 50 MHz), the Diamond DXCC Challenge and the Morse Code Proficiency Certificate -- seen on Mike Baxter's home shack wall.

Two other regular cast members -- Mike's boss Ed Alzate (played by Hector Elizondo) and Mike's co-worker Kyle Anderson (played by Christoph Sanders) -- will also have Amateur Radio call signs and be shown on the radio.

"As a ham, I am very excited to be able to have an episode that presents our hobby in an upbeat and positive way," Amodeo told the ARRL. "As a television producer, I am pleased to present a very funny episode for our more than 7 million viewers. This episode will feature more ham gear than seen in mainstream movies such as *Frequency*, *Contact* and *Super 8* -- all great films that had Amateur Radio in them. It's worth noting that although hams will enjoy the episode, it was written with our 7 million non-ham viewers in mind. Please be prepared for some inconsistencies related to Amateur Radio, but enjoy the show nevertheless."

Last Man Standing is produced by 20th Century Fox for the ABC Television Network and airs on Friday nights at 8 PM Eastern and Pacific and 7 PM Central.

This week, Surfin' explores the mysterious world of numbers stations.

Norman Wald, W9VQ, alerted me about a new film called <u>*The Numbers Station*</u> that tells the story of a black ops agent (played by John Cusack) assigned to protect "the security of a young female code announcer (Malin Akerman), code resources and [the] remote station they are assigned to." Remember numbers stations? Typically, a numbers station features an artificially generated female voice speaking strings of numbers, but shortwave listeners have also heard male and child announcers, and the contents of the messages are not always numbers.

Although they are often considered a Cold War phenomena, numbers stations are still on the air today, transferring covert messages to spies around the globe via the short waves. As recently as 2009, for example, a married couple -- <u>Walter and Gwendolyn Myers</u> -- was arrested as spies in Washington, DC, after three decades of spying for Cuba. Their keepers in Cuba communicated with them via encrypted shortwave radio messages in Morse code or by a voice reading numbers in a sequence.

Over the years, I have heard numbers stations on the air. If you search up and down the low bands tonight, you may encounter one or two of these stations yourself. Or you can sample recordings of numbers stations on <u>The Numbers Game</u>, <u>YouTube</u> and other online file sharing services. Many of the YouTube recordings are from <u>The Conet Project</u>, a legendary CD collection of numbers stations recordings that has achieved cult status. 
