Richard KA5IQX Once again, local "ham" operators were busy providing communications and escort duty for the "Tour-du-Rouge" bike

event, as the bike riders came through the area on May 5th and 6th. It's quite an undertaking for the bikers, as they ride from Houston to New Orleans over several days ... and on the first day of that journey, both Houston "hams" and those from the "Golden Triangle" area, were heavily involved.

The Houston group escorted and SAG'd the bikers to the outskirts of Nome, on highway 90, where local "hams" began to assist in helping the riders to get through the Beaumont portion of the route safely. As they came into Nome, we directed them to turn onto the "Old Nome Highway" ... which took them to China, Texas ... where they rode down the main street ... past all of the skyscrapers, observation towers, and the outdoor "WoodChuck Pavilion", where the China, 3-piece symphony orchestra was playing their rendition of "Riders In The Storm". (which was odd, because it was a sunny day)

Then, it was on into Beaumont via the "Old Sour Lake Highway", until they turned right, onto the "Old Sour Grapes Highway"... which runs parallel to the "Old Fritter Freeway", which finally runs into the "Old Dirt Road" right next to the hotel. ("Ye Old Elegante' Inn & Blacksmith Shop") Lets face it. By the time we got there ... all of us were a lot older

But ... what was really cool was ... the Red Cross had set up tables under a huge tent, where the riders could get a free massage, after their long and difficult trip. I actually managed to get four massages before they figured out I had already been through the line several times and not only that I wasn't even a rider. I tried to explain that I was an important part of the event, and that I had been very busy ... following behind the riders to make sure they made it to the hotel ok. Unfortunately, they had three witnesses and a photograph, showing that I was NOT following any bike riders I was following a Blue Bell ice cream truck that was well off the route. Hey ... how was I to know? It looked so similar to the Red Cross truck. Sheeesh

Anyway, it was good to meet and talk with some of the Houston area "hams" after we got to the hotel. Kirk (N5WKM), Fred (KF5FNO) and I, had a great conversation with them, under the shade of an "Old Oak Tree" ... (No... that's not a road, it's actually a tree) We decided that next year we're going to add parade floats and a Blue Bell ice cream truck to the SAG vehicles. (The ice cream truck was my idea) Some of the Houston group were ... Lee (WA5QXE) .. Rich (KE5ZZP) ... and Frank (N5EJX).

The next morning ... bright and early ... (I think I got there at 2pm) ... we escorted the bikers down "Old Cardinal Drive" and then down "Old West Port Arthur Rd" and onto Pleasure Island. After the bikers took a break at the rest stop on the Island, we continued to escort them until they rode over the Causeway Bridge into Louisiana.

All in all ... things went quite well ... and the weather was perfect. We're looking forward to doing it again next year ... and I'm sure it will be even better. There were 95 riders this year ... which was a considerable increase from last year ... so the event seems to be gaining in popularity. All the more reason we need to be there to assist in case there are any bike breakdowns, physical problems, or perhaps simply a rider who has taken the wrong road. We do make a difference, so if you are available next year at this time, be sure to volunteer to help ... and as always ... let's

MOTHER'S MARCH AND SIMULATED EMERGENCY TEST

There were several events taking place over the past few weeks. Each one was a bit different, but all were interesting and enjoyable. This is an extremely busy time of year for "ham" operators in this area, and trying to be involved in all of the activities can really keep you jumping.

One event was the "Mother's March For Babies", which was held on April 20th, on the campus of Lamar University. Rich (N5ALE), Ray (WA5DQW) and I were assigned to "Station 4" ... which fortunately for me, was located very close to the newly constructed "Apple Fritter Plaza" ... paid for by a donation from the "Fitness and Fritters Foundation". It's a "must see" for any visitor to the campus ... with a flowing fountain of "melted butter" in the center of the cobblestone plaza ... surrounded by six vendor booths ... each one selling "apple fritter sandwiches" and refreshing "fritter icing coolers". No doubt about it ... it was ten times better than DisneyWorld.

The "Mother's March" was quite successful ... and it wasn't just mothers who were walking the route. There were also plenty of men ... along with kids in strollers ... kids in wagons ... kids on skateboards ... dogs on skateboards ... dogs walking with their owners ... cats walking with the people they own ... two racoons driving go-carts ... and on one part of the route, a flock of great-tailed grackles ... flying and swooping over the walkers below them ... and apparently playing a game which could be accurately called "Dodge This If You Can". It was great fun for all ... especially the birds. (Artistic License used at this point for "story enhancement" purposes)

Rich had a "clicker" to keep track of how many walkers passed our location. I counted 16,287 ... but Rich was the official "clicker guy" ... and his count was about 1,050 or so. In his count, he included dogs as being two people, since they had four legs. I believe the reason for the difference between my count results and his, was the fact that I was on a "sugar high" ... and therefore my perception of reality had been distorted. (Also known as "Fritter Overload")

Lynn (KF5LNZ) and Carla (KF5CEE) were on bike patrol for the event ... and Rich was able to set up his APRS mobile system as a portable digi-peater, so that the APRS beacon from the "bike turtle" (following behind the last of the walkers) could reach the digi-peater in downtown Beaumont, and then hit an "I-gate" to allow it to display on the APRS internet web site. So, not only could we receive information via their radio reports ... but we could also get a great "visual" perspective as to where the "hams" were at any particular time along the route. Of course nobody ever knew where I was ... including me.

We also had the ARES "SET" on April 27. (Amateur Radio Emergency Service ... Simulated Emergency Test). This can be enjoyable ... but it's also a very useful exercise to improve communications skills and become more familier with proceedures and the various types of equipment and transmission modes available to "ham operators" these days. By holding "practice sessions" like this ... along with our annual "Field Day" exercise ... it helps to recognize problems, and find solutions before a real emergency takes place.

Orange ... Jefferson County ... and Jasper "ham" groups were all participating ... and "ham" operators were also stationed at the Port Arthur Police Department ... the Texas Department of Public Safety in Beaumont ... and the Red Cross building in Orange. The guys and gals who participated in this exercise were certainly doing their part to "Ham It Up" as we all should. As always, there are more events coming up, so volunteer to help if you can.

The FCC once again denied an ARRL Petition for Reconsideration regarding the Commission's BPL rules.

ARRL leadership met with FEMA Administrator Craig Fugate, KK4INZ, to discuss Amateur Radio's role in public service and disaster communications.

World Amateur Radio Day -- celebrating the 88th anniversary of the founding of the IARU -- was April 18.

The ARRL is offering T-shirts, mugs, hats, pins and patches for 2013 Field Day.

The <u>deadline</u> to apply for the ARRL's Teachers Institute on Wireless Technology, as well as for equipment and resource grants, is May 15 and May 1, respectively.

WIAW News: W1AW Station Manager Joe Carcia, NJ1Q, installed two new audio oscillators for use on 2 meters and EchoLink conference server W1AWBDCT.

Development Update: ARRL Individual Giving Manager Lauren Clarke, KB1YDD, reported that the <u>ARRL Diamond Club</u> is at 30 percent of its 2013 goal (419 donors), the <u>Spectrum Defense Fund</u> is at 7.5 percent of its goal (241 donors) and the <u>Education & Technology Fund</u> is at 19 percent of its goal (60 donors). The ARRL <u>announced</u> the top three finishers in the annual *QST* Video Contest.

The ARRL <u>introduced</u> a T-shirt, key chain, pin and challenge coin to commemorate the 75th birthday of W1AW, the Hiram Percy Maxim Memorial Station.

Chris Brewer, N5GMJ, was <u>appointed</u> ARRL North Texas Section Manager, replacing Walt Mayfield, KE5SOO, who resigned due to work and family commitments.

The <u>32nd Annual ARRL/TAPR Digital Communications Conference</u> will be held September 20-22 in Seattle, Washington.

For the 12th year in a row, the ARRL has been approved to participate in the Combined Federal Campaign.

A <u>new QuickStats Poll</u> was posted to the ARRL website.

The winner of the April QST Cover Plaque Award is George Wallner, AA7JV, for his article "The Garden Beam."

The June print issue of <u>OST</u> and the May/June issues of <u>NCJ</u> and <u>OEX</u> were released to the printer. The June digital edition of <u>QST</u> was released to the digital publisher. The <u>May digital edition of QST</u> was made available to ARRL members. A new book, <u>Understanding Your Antenna Analyzer</u>, was released to the printer. A third printing of both <u>The ARRL Satellite Handbook</u> and <u>Hints & Kinks (18th edition)</u> were also sent to the printer.

Official Observer Desk: ARRL Field and Regulatory Correspondent Chuck Skolaut, K0BOG, handled complaints concerning hang glider pilots not identifying properly while using 2 meters, RFI from a CB operator using high power in Arizona, interference to repeaters in Washington, DC, a pool pump causing interference on the ham bands in Arizona and a numbers station on 30 meters.

Surfin': How Far Away Is the Horizon?

Here are some online tools to help you answer that question.

As a fan of VHF and UHF operating, I often seek out mountaintop locations so I can work some DX, unimpeded by manmade objects and Mother Nature's higher hills. And while I appreciate the view, I often wonder how far away the horizon is.

I discovered a great article about this topic years ago and after reading the article again, I realized that it was still good stuff. So without further ado, I refer you to Phil Plait's blog post "How far away is the horizon?" on *DISCOVER Magazine*'s website.

So you don't have to do the math, Erik Rasmussen -- who writes the <u>American in Spain</u> blog -- has an <u>online distance-to-horizon calculator</u> (scroll down to the end of the blog post). And even better, Larry Johnston, W4SAT, has a <u>VHF/UHF line of sight calculator</u>.

This is <u>Hamvention</u> weekend --- probably the biggest non-operating ham radio event of the year. More than 20,000 hams (including me) get together in America's heartland to celebrate Amateur Radio. I hope to see you there, and you can expect a full Hamvention report from me in the coming weeks.


