## General Meeting Minutes April 12, 2013 Mike McMillan, K6MCM, Secretary

**Opening:** The meeting was called to order at 7:34 p.m. by President Fowler. Sign-in sheet was circulated, members and guests signed in. A round of self-introductions was made. Minutes of the March 8, 2013 meeting were approved as published in *The Blown Fuse*.

Question of the day was "How do you use a computer with your station?" Responses included: don't use a computer; use logging software and digital modes; program memories

into the radio; want to look into softwaredefined radio; trying to learn Fldigi; look up maps of users on the air; get signal reports online; have APRS station; and use the Internet to look up ham events.

**Program:** First Vice-President Burris reported that tonight's program will be Dave Palmer, KB5WIA. He has been licensed since 1992 and holds an Amateur Advanced class license. His main radio interests are the ham radio satellites, but he also works VHF, QRP, HF mobile, and EME when he gets the chance. He will be talking about his expedition to activate grid square CM79. Next month's program is scheduled to be Cal students discussing the W6BB Cal Radio Club.

**Hospitality:** Second Vice-President Sparks provided excellent refreshments.

**Membership:** Third Vice-President Primbsch was absent.

**Finance:** Treasurer Jenkins reported club financial information. General fund balance was \$4,065.41; station fund balance was \$3,520.80. Federal taxes have been filed as well as state forms.

**Secretary:** Secretary McMillan reported no significant correspondence received.

**Station Manager:** Gleason reported rotor connection and water connection still to be resolved.

**Public Events/Education:** Jenkins reported Grizzly Peak Century coming May 5, radio operators still needed. Boy Scout hike June first also looking for radio operators. See links on EBARC website for more information.

Web Page: Webmaster Hoffman absent.

**President:** Fowler reported General class going on, members are welcome to sit in and perhaps share some test equipment or stories.

**New Members and Guests:** Several new members and guests were introduced.

Announcements: Member-at-Large Spalding displayed a brochure from the OM International Sideband Society (www.omiss.net). "OMISS is an awards-type net with its primary focus on newer Amateurs ready to jump into the wild world of radio communications. All hams General or higher are welcome to join." Member Bob Frederick made contact with Friends of the Library and reported most donated books go right to sales. We need to have books approved by the main library committee in Pleasant Hill before we can be sure they will be placed on the shelves for patrons. A new book from ARRL, "Ham Radio for Arduino and PICAXE," was displayed featuring a chapter and cover photo by EBARC member Alan Biocca, W6AKB.

**Next Meeting:** the next meeting will be on May 10, 2013.

**Closing:** There being no further business, the membership meeting adjourned at 8:08 p.m.

**Presentation:** After a break for refreshments, Dave Palmer, KB5WIA, gave a very interesting presentation about QSOs via satellites. satellites in service, and how their polar-orbits enable multiple chances for contacts each day. He then went into his Dxpedition to activate grid square CM79, one of the very rare squares on the coast of northern California. Although he made several field trials of the equipment, he kept facing new challenges. Then three days before leaving for the adventure, he received a letter from ARRL saying his physical coverage of the four grid square corners had to be modified. Overcoming steep terrain, needing to hike all equipment in several miles, and carrying his bear spray, he was finally able to configure a two antenna setup that allowed him to make multiple satellite contacts from the four grid corners including the rare CM79.

# Father & Son Bring Accuracy to Telegraph Scenes in *Lincoln*

Charlottesville: Steven Spielberg's new film, Lincoln, shows the importance of the telegraph during the [Civil] war years. Local Morse code enthusiasts Jim Wilson and his son Matt helped the renowned filmmaker attain a level of historical authenticity as it pertains to the telegraph of that era.

Jim Wilson is the longtime editor of *Dots &Dashes*, the official publication of the Morse Telegraph Club Inc. For years, he and his son have participated in Civil War re-enactments as telegraph operators of the period.

[Spielberg's staff] wanted us to be technical consultants and put together a class for the actors who would be portraying the operators. We did that, and on Oct. 17, 2011, in Mechanicsville, we taught about 30 people about things like how to hold the telegraph key. We showed them how to send the original American Morse code, not the International Morse code that was introduced later.

"The main telegraph operator in the film was brought down from a stage play he was doing on Broadway." said Jim Wilson, a Vietnam veteran who taught Morse code while serving in the Army. "He asked to borrow our telegraph key and sounder overnight. When he came back the next day, he had that particular message memorized and could send it perfectly."

Jim Wilson learned Morse code from his father, who was a ham radio operator. In turn, he taught it to his son when he became interested in it.

Both Wilsons appear in the *Lincoln* movie, most of which was filmed in Richmond and Petersburg. The father is seen as a businessman, and the son portrays a telegraph operator.

The father-son team provided Spielberg with exact information on what Lincoln's telegraph office looked like. It was two blocks from the White House and became one of the President's favorite haunts.

"As a potential Spielberg classic," said Matt Wilson, "I assumed *Lincoln* would also be an important historical chronicle, so it was important to get it right.

"Being meticulous and scrutinizing, even in our small role, felt like a meaningful contribution to telling history with accuracy."
