General Meeting Minutes August 10, 2012 Mike McMillan, K6MCM, Secretary

Opening: The meeting was called to order at 7:35 p.m. by President Fowler. A sign-in sheet was circulated &19 members signed in. A round of self-introductions was made including the question, "How many ham radio books do you own?" Answers varied from none to six, 30-40, too many to count, 150 pounds, and even, "I just threw out a bunch of obsolete books." Minutes of the July 13, 2012 meeting were approved as published in *The Blown Fuse*.

Program: First Vice-President Burris reported he would present tonight's program on Field Day results followed by a video on antenna theory and function. Next month's program is scheduled to be on Radio Sausalito, an independent commercial station.

Hospitality: Second Vice-President Sparks provided an excellent array of refreshments.

Membership: Third Vice-President Primbsch was absent. Please send Sharon information for the next edition of *The Blown Fuse*.

Finance: Treasurer Jenkins reported club financial information. General fund balance was \$3,270.28; station fund balance was \$3,664.25. Monthly income was \$32.71; expenses were \$289.65.

Secretary: Secretary McMillan reported one correspondence, a QSL card request.

Station Manager: Gleason reported two roof parties are planned. Help is needed to complete club station roof repairs. Another work party will be scheduled later for the main tower cable repair.

Public Events/Education: Jenkins reported not much on this side of the bay, but plenty of Marin activity. Fowler reported an upcoming Technician class that will include General class information – students should be able to pass either test. Classes will start on September 12 at the West Contra Costa Adult School Alvarado campus in Richmond.

Announcements: The Raspberry Pi, a \$25 credit-card sized computer that plugs into your TV and a keyboard, was shown by Mathison Ott, KJ6DZB. It's a capable little PC which can be used for many of the things that your desktop PC does like spreadsheets, wordprocessing, and games. It also plays highdefinition video. Joe Lee, W6DOB, was present to take orders for EBARC name badges (\$5 payable in advance). Two club members rode their electric bicycles to the meeting and explained their operation during the break.

Next Meeting: The next EBARC general meeting will be on September 14, 2012.

Closing: There being no further business, the membership meeting was adjourned at 8:07 p.m.

Presentation: After a break for refreshments, Jack Burris, K6JEB, discussed the results for Field Day showing the completed tally forms submitted to ARRL. Jack then showed a video demonstrating how antennas function. Scale models of dipoles and Yagis were used to illustrate radiating lobes and null spots as functions of antenna height, length, and design. The speaker was able to clearly show how these affect radiating angle and polarization, a very informative video.

Book Review: *Thunderstruck* Peter Hoffman, W6DEI

The October 2009 issue of QST contained a review of a terrific book by Erik Larson called *Thunderstruck*. I'm sure I read that review, but I'd completely forgotten about it until Don Hamma (who obviously has a better memory than I) reminded me of it. Coincidentally, my XYL has read several excellent books by this author which she highly recommended to me: *Death in the White City, Isaac's Storm*, and *Thunderstruck*. Larson is a terrific non-fiction writer and meticulous researcher whose books are riveting and bring to life bygone eras.

The first book of his that I read was *Isaac's Storm* about the early days of weather science, the National Weather Service, and a devastating hurricane that hit Galveston, TX in the early 1900s leaving over 6,000 Galvestonians dead. Pieced together from letters, diaries, interviews with descendents, and newspaper accounts, it is a page-turner that vividly recounts this major historical event and makes you feel as if you were there, riding your horse and buggy to work in a growing city that was the main shipping port on the Gulf Coast.

But for anyone with a passion for radio, Thunderstruck can't be beat. It's really two stories that run in parallel with chapters alternating between the two. One is the story of the early efforts to develop radio, and specifically Marconi's attempt to build a long distance wireless communications system and a company to exploit this new technology. The other story is about an infamous murder in north London that captured the attention of the world much as the O.J. Simpson murders did here in the 1990s. As in Isaac's Storm both stories are extremely well researched and documented and give you a real sense of life in those times (1890s-1910s). And like Isaac's Storm it's a real page turner. Toward the end of the book, these two seemingly unrelated stories come together in an exciting climax and one that greatly (and unexpectedly) boosted

Marconi's fortunes and subsequent fame in the early history of wireless communications.

The QST article kind of gives away too much of the plot, in my opinion. So I'll just leave this review as is and won't spoil the ending for anyone who might like to read this book. All I can say is, I can't imagine any ham not enjoying it as much as I did.
