Working bee to finish loop antenna

Gate Key: Another key has been "hidden" in a black box, magnetically attached to the back of the metal post. (The original gate key went missing at about the time that the gate had been knocked over while concrete footpaths were being laid). We regard this gate as a nuisance, but Auckland Council (the land owners) have materials stored in the buildings. A burglary there and reports of undesirable characters hanging around prompted Council to patrol the property regularly and keep the gate locked. In the event that a Member finds himself and his car locked in, there is an emergency gate key hanging just below the alarm pad, inside the clubroom door.

AREC and Civil Defense Shakedown:

We had hoped to report the outcome of a review of AREC communications exercise. However the AREC Regional Committee does not meet until 22nd November.

Antennas: Poles have been positioned around the yard, and halyards have been attached ready to hoist the big loop antenna. During the course of our working bee on this project, a Member was heard to say, "This is the best Saturday I've had here. Everybody seems to be busy doing something."

Some reflective tape has been put around one pole that is directly in the pathway of cars approaching leaving the clubroom. Committee members were thankful for this as they were leaving in the dark after our last Committee Meeting.

This project will be continued after our next General Meeting day on Saturday 17th November. We need some more helpers to hold guy ropes, etc.

Afterwards, tests need to be made to tune the antenna to perform at its best.





JOTA: On Labour Day Weekend I went to Camp Maynard near Albany to set up a Fox hunt for Scouts and Guides at JOTA (Jubilee On The Air). This was one of a dozen activities that were staged by North Shore Branch. for hundreds of uniformed Scouts, Guides, et alia, who came to gain their Communications badge. There were a total of over 500 attendees (including parents) over the entire weekend. Some camped there overnight.

JOTI (Jamboree On The Internet) was facilitated by a roomful of laptops running Echolink. This proved to be very popular.

Wallace described his function as organizing the JOTA Fox hunt by providing Instructions, maps and clip cards; then delegating its operation to the Rangers assigned to this activity. They placed the foxes in the treed area of about two acres where dozens of scouts where camping. This was only one of several activities for hundreds of uniformed children, ranging in age from 8 to 16, to earn a Communications badge. Wallace said that he ran it as a competition by posting scores on a display line. He supplied Graham Barton ZL1GMB – North Shore Branch organizer – with electronic format of Start Sheet, Clip cards maps and Results calculator so that the activity may be run again in future years.

Antenna project:

Bases for the 80m loop have been positioned in the yard and bamboo poles selected.

Gwynne has made some guy attachment points.

Steve has attached halyards and put red reflecting tape on the pole in the centre of the yard.

Another working bee is needed to string the wire and test it.

Remotely operated station:

George reported that he and Simon ZL1SSW had tried unsuccessfully to get George's K3/0 (client console) to interface with the K3. Meanwhile George will attend Musick Point Radio Club tomorrow to inspect their remote station. He requires more support.

He has two relays to be used for switching antennas.

The question of continuing this project was debated at length because other operating stations are being compromised by having to unplug antennas from the K3 (in its difficult to get at position). It was resolved to attach only the new 80m loop antenna (which will operate on all bands).

Meanwhile, other Client users have not been able to connect to the Server and therefore to the K3.

Alternative software: RCForb (the Blenheim remote site), MixW, TRX Manager - no progress in evaluating these.

Equipment out on loan - OK

LAN – is working. Wallace will commission a PC at each operating station.

Wallace has purchased (US\$92.00) a CD containing Band Master, DXAtlas and IonoProbe. This suite of software is used to read DX spots and automatically tune a transceiver and /or listen to beacons, lookup QRZ,etc.

Photocopier – George will provide more copying paper. There are adequate supplies of toner in its lower cupboard.

Beam Alignment and rotator replacement – To be done when Steve and Japie are available together with their respective trucks, hopefully on 17th November when the loop antenna will be completed.

+ USPS Seeks to Phase Out IRCs



If the US Postal Service (USPS) gets its way, it will no longer sell International Reply Coupons (IRCs) after January 27, 2013. According to the October 23 edition of the Federal Register, there is not sufficient demand for the USPS to continue offering IRCs to customers; however, per the Universal Postal Union (UPU) regulations, the USPS must continue to exchange and redeem IRCs that have been purchased in foreign countries and presented at USPS facilities. Comments on this proposed change will be accepted through November 23, 2012. IRCs provide foreign addressees with a prepaid means of responding to inquiries, solicitations or other types of communications -- such as QSL cards -- that are initiated by US senders. IRCs are exchangeable for

postage stamps by postal administrations in member countries of the UPU. Each IRC is equivalent in value to the destination country's minimum postage price for an unregistered airmail letter. The purchase price is in the US is currently \$2.20 per IRC. -- Thanks to The Daily DX for some information.




The Fox hunting page




Interest has been shown by some of the participants in this year's Inter-branch Fox hunting Competition, to stage an event in the vicinity of Musick Point. While there is no Orienteering map here, I am investigating the possibility of using a street map that links McLean's Park and Eastern Beach.

Meanwhile in anticipation of another Fox hunting event next year, below is the orienteering map that we shall be using for the next Branch event with the Scouts and Guides. Churchill park is in Glendowie, accessible via Kinsdale Avenue where the Scouts and Guides have their halls and where there is ample parking. It is an area of about 20 acres of undulating grazing pasture, dotted with stands of old pine trees. Paths run though and around its perimeter, so it is friendly underfoot.



+ Logbook of The World Expected to Be Back Online soon



ARRL Information Technology Manager Michael Keane, K1MK, is reporting that while Logbook of The World (LoTW) system is currently down, it is expected to be back up by 9 AM EST (1400 UTC) on Friday, November 9. "While the system is temporarily down, radio amateurs are not able to access LoTW or upload their logs," Keane explained. "No data has been lost, and everyone's records are intact. We understand the problem and we are in the process of restoring service to LoTW. Since both the Logbook of The World service and the Online DXCC service are connected to the ARRL Awards System, radio amateurs are not able to access either service until the system is restored. We apologize for any inconvenience this may cause, and want to assure the amateur community that the ARRL is working diligently to restore service to these popular programs."
