Two of the Franklin stations had to be withdrawn due to medical events, leaving just Ian ZL1PZ at Lyons Road and Tom ZL1TO at McNicol Road.

There were no significant incidents on the cycle route, and all volunteers were able to get moving homeward before lunch.



Scammer targets licence holders on social media

RSM has been made aware that a scammer is using a Facebook account claiming to work for Radio Spectrum Management and asking for personal information from licence holders and radio users. Radio Spectrum Management would never contact radio users or licence holders on social media asking for their personal and financial details, IRD numbers or password. In this case, personal information and meetings have been requested. Clubhouse matters

Fire extinguishers: Bruce ZL1TDH organised a visit by Counties Firewatch. A recommendation and quote has been obtained for a 2 kg carbon dioxide extinguisher in the kitchen and a 2.5 kg foam extinguisher inside the meeting room near the double doors. The extinguishers should be tested every year, with a hydraulic test every 5 years.

Electrical: Bruce ZL1TDH reported that the inspection was done by Peter Hinton on Friday 12 January. Our building passed in the commercial category. It was suggested that we might upgrade the switchboard – but as the building is commercial, change the porcelain fuses, and main switch to circuit breakers. The main fuse would be replaced with a 32 amp circuit breaker. The cost of parts would be around \$250. Bruce's estimate to replace the ceiling batten holders and fluorescent lamps and all light switches would be \$1190. Members preferred that option should be deferred.

Questions asked were "If the building burnt down – would Council let us rebuild on this site? Would they let us move in a used prefab? Would a garage style building, lined and with kitchen, toilet and shack of similar size and proper aluminium joinery be acceptable?"

It was noted that risks for the source of fire would include – cigarette butt under the floor, microwave oven, paper falling into wall heaters, loosening cables in switches. Members were made aware of the risks.

60 m Limited operation

NZART is pleased to announce that it has negotiated with RSM and the NZ Defence Force to obtain a licence to allow limited operation by ZL amateur operators on 60 m on a trial basis.

The purpose of the trial is for RSM, NZART and primary users to investigate the ability for the amateur radio operators to operate on the frequencies of operation on a secondary basis without causing interference to primary users.

As the licence is held by NZART and the GURL which covers amateur bands does not include 60 m, those who wish to operate on the band must complete and sign the attached a sublicence with NZART which sets out the terms of operation before they can operate.

This is then to be scanned and emailed to Debby at Headquarters (<u>nzart@nzart.org</u>). Once she acknowledges receipt you can begin operation.

Operation centres on 5353 kHz and 5362 - 5364 kHz with a maximum output of 10 dBW e.i.r.p.

Also set out below are some FAQs which we strongly suggest you read before you start to ensure you stay within the rules.

We hope you enjoy these new privileges.

60 m Frequently asked questions

Q: Why do I need a Sub-Licence when I can operate on the Amateur bands already?

The GURL which covers the amateur bands does not include 60 m so Amateurs have no right to operate there (despite WRC-15 allocating an amateur band in that region). NZART has negotiated

negotiated with RSM to obtain a licence to allow limited operation on 60 m as a trial. Accordingly a Sub-Licence from NZART is required for you to operate legally.

Q: Why is this a trial when we were given full access to the band at WRC-15?

Despite a worldwide amateur allocation being made on a secondary basis, access is subject to the approval of the local regulatory authorities in each country. In ZL RSM has said that access will be subject to the approval of the primary user which in this case is the NZ Defence Force. The NZDF have asked for a trial so they can monitor amateur use to see if it can happen on a non-interference basis.

Q: How long is the trial for?

It has been set down for a year until December 2018 but that can be changed at any time by MBIE (RSM).

You will be advised if any change is made.

Q: How do I know I am operating with a power of 10 dBW e.i.r.p?

E.I.R.P. = TX power output in dBW, less losses to the antenna (dB), plus antenna gain (dBi). This licence is for 10 dBW e.i.r.p. which equals 10 Watts e.i.r.p. Peak envelope power (PEP)

For example:

Half wave dipole 7 m above poor ground +2 dBi
Feedline, balun & connector losses -1 dB
Transmitter Power 8 W +9 dBW
Total Power 10 dBW e.i.r.p

Humanity Star

When the Electron Rocket was successfully launched from Mahia Peninsula on 21 January it carried three commercial satellites, and an additional test payload was a disco ball. The ball has been named *Humanity Star* and should result in flashes of sunlight being reflected to observers on the ground on some passes.

These Terahertz radiations should be observable by the human eye when the satellite is sunlit, but the ground is in shadow.

The table below gives predictions by the program *Satscape* for visible passes of *Humanity Star* over Auckland.

The table headings mean..

S-AZ Start azimuth or bearing on the true compass MAX-EL Greatest angle above the horizon in degrees MAX-AZ Bearing in degrees at maximum elevation DUR Duration of the pass in minutes and seconds E-AZ Azimuth as the satellite drops below the horizon LIT The satellite is in direct sunlight VIS Satellite is visible
