Jock White Field Days

The annual contest is this coming weekend, 23-24 February. The club will endeavour to have a 40 m and an 80 m transceiver operating throughout the 18 hours of the contest.

A small crew will be at the clubhouse late Saturday morning to gather rigs, antennas, operating tables and chairs, generator and paper work. From midday the antenna poles will be hoisted and the stations assembled and tested. Then the contest begins at 3 pm. After breaking for a rest from midnight to 6 am the contest resumes for a further 9 hours on Sunday.

This year we return to Attewell Road as the venue, about 2 km south east of the junction with the Pukekohe-Waiuku road. You can see from the aerial photograph that the site is set among fields of crops. So local electrical noise is not as high as in town. We usually allocate an operator to each station for an hour at a time, but will willingly fit in any visitor who wants to 'have a go'.

If time permits, a video clip showing how we have run the contest on a previous occasion can be shown on Club Night, 19 February.

The Bombay Fun Run is organised by the Bombay Lions Club to celebrate the arrival on 18 March 1865 of the ship "Bombay" from England. The "Bombay" was towed into Auckland by the warship "Curacao", having lost a large portion of her masts and rigging in a terrible storm off the coast of New Zealand. There were 400 assisted immigrants on board destined for the area now called Bombay where they were to settle on their promised 10 acre allotments.

To reach their new home they travelled along the Gt South Rd from Drury to Bombay, a road that had just been completed by the army. The 10 km and half marathon course is along the path they would have travelled. The 5 km takes in part of the road but trails around a picturesque rural road taking in another area of Bombay.

Dirty Power

Eric ZL1ERI was invited to speak and gave a presentation on 'dirty power' at the January general meeting. The circuit of Eric's measuring instrument was explained. The level within the clubhouse was undiminished with fluorescent lights off, and computer power supply unplugged. Member's cell phones were checked, with a modern smart phone giving a reading at least 10 times that of its older cousins.

The most common source of dirty power is likely to be from switch mode power supplies in our homes. The ubiquitous wall wart takes much of the blame.

Dirty power is deserving of an in depth report. This will require all sides of the argument to be presented. On the one hand we have the electrosensitive community and on the other people like ourselves who deliberately transmit electromagnetic energy while keeping within the limits of the recognized health standard. Then we have to wear the consequences of the increasing background radio noise which impacts on our ability to receive radio messages.

Stop Press - Rain and wind are forecast for Sunday. Itinerant visitors to field days are recommended to come Saturday.

Activity in clubhouse neighbourhood

For several years the reserve land beside the clubhouse had been used as little more than a parking spot for local businesses and ourselves. When it was proposed that a skate park be built in that space the club felt that we should not protest the new use. After all we are simply tenants on a Council reserve. Admitted, we did have misgivings about the way that skate boarding clientele would impact on our own activities.

Unfortunately since the skate park has been completed the damage to buildings has increased, and graffiti to the Opera Club premises next door has reached a completely demoralizing level. We have had two incidents of interference at the basement level, and copper water pipe has been taken in one area. Our graffiti has been caught while it was fresh and could be scrubbed clean.

There had been several older youths who had been in the habit of driving their vehicles down the driveway to park by the Opera Club. Invariably these particular skate park users have been belligerent and use bad language. Their attitude has moderated a little since the driveway has been closed with a locked chain.

On 19 December a small delegation from our club met with the Strategic Broker - Arts, Community and Events of Auckland Council. Arising from that meeting:

It was purely a coincidence that the skate park contractor had been on the grounds at the same time as the lady from Council in mid December. There is no plan to do extension work at the skate park. The Local Board has a three year planning process which is discussed at annual plan time. Nowhere on the plan for the next year. It is wishful thinking at the moment.

Photographs of the state of our back lawn before and after the skate park build were seen. Likewise we saw photographs of the large tags on the Opera Club building. Manukau Beautification Trust has an interest in getting rid of graffiti.

We would like the space as far back as the wooden aerial pole to be included in our lease.

We noted that a 'see through' fence was anticipated to separate the skate park from the two community clubs. No funds are currently set aside.

The non-restoration of the area between the clubs by removing the construction platform that the skate park contractor had built of spoil from the skate park. Metal (ie steel) objects that resurface at the platform site make mowing impractical now.

All could see value in CCTV from a high point on the skate park boundary.

There is absolutely no intention to open the wooden fence

Method of controlling car parking behind our club was discussed. Agreed that the Council should consider a lockable bollard on the driveway – funds permitting.

We are to forward pictures and pass further information on graffiti to the Council's graffiti line.

Agreed it was a good idea to put a gate to bar access to the back wall of FARC clubhouse and the nearby fence. Mike ZL1UOM will action.
