
Papakura Branch Newsletter

Clubhouse Concerns

Since 2018, when Auckland Council built a skate-part next door, our clubhouse, a rock solid symbol of our hobby, built in the 1960s and maintained with care by our members, has been targeted by individuals whose hobby is to destroy the enjoyment other people gain from their hobbies.

An exaggeration perhaps? Let me provide you with some general detail in support of this claim and specific detail on the most recent attacks on our clubhouse.

Club secretary Tom McDonald has been meticulous in his documentation of police reports, phone calls and photographs of these attacks. In 2018 there were three buildings on our site. Our club, Franklin Amateur Radio Club, was nearest to the road. Pukekohe Performing Arts had two buildings in the area directly behind us, a garage and a small house, which were used to store props and clothing. Less than a year after the skate-park opened, individuals who used the skate-park to hang out had broken into both Performing Arts structures by kicking through the weatherboard cladding. Auckland Council repaired the breakages many times but attacks continued. Soon both Performing Arts buildings were so damaged the Council was forced to demolish them but not before the attackers attempted to burn them down in a final spasm of hatred for other people's hobbies.

Since Performing Arts were destroyed, we have kept close watch on our clubhouse, not wanting to be next. Several of us visit when we can and report any graffiti or damage so it can be addressed. Durlene ZL1ULK walks her dog in the mornings and checks the clubhouse often.



On the morning of Wednesday 1 June, Tom checked the clubhouse and found persons unknown had kicked in boarding which the covered the underfloor area of the clubhouse. Several plastic cups and drug miscellaneous paraphernalia were inside

On June 4, Durlene found the attackers had come back and struck in the same location. This time, they removed the boarding completely so they would not damage themselves or their clothing while crawling about under our damaged clubhouse.



As before there was evidence of fresh plastic cup material, soft drink cans and some broken balloons. As Tom had done for every attack, he reported this damage to police who sent a forensic expert to acquire what biologic clues might be present.



The next day, June 5, a three man team of Mike, Steve and myself came with power tools, nails, and coach screws. We did our best to fix the boarding back to the uprights. We managed to find some slightly wider planks to replace those the attackers had ruined.

Faced with this evidence of sustained and deliberate damage to our chubhouse, it is hard to avoid the thought that our hobby is under threat. Auckland Council appear to think this also. Local Council Member Andy Baker met with four committee members at the club on Thursday 14 April and told us a fence between the radio club and the skate-park would only invite further continued trouble as we saw when they trashed the back buildings. He wanted to hear our reaction to the council lifting our clubhouse, at no cost to us, and getting us away from the skate park. We responded that we would welcome such a move.

Today, two months later on Saturday 11 June, we have yet to hear of any further development from Auckland Council on their suggestion to move us. Just half an hour ago, I found the latest attack in the form of graffiti on the walls of the clubhouse showed our attackers have not given up.

Meanwhile, we will keep those power tools and paint tins ready for whatever those whose hobby it is to hate other people's hobbies will throw at us and trust that when the council tell us they are ready to relocate us there will still be a clubhouse left.

Straight Key Night: June 12 8PM

Straight keys were the first Morse keys developed in the 1840s to send code across America. A straight key is a single-pole switch turning a current on or off with the default position set as off. Later, many other types of key came into operation to reduce operator fatigue but the straight key has never really gone out of use and thousands of hams worldwide still use them.

Straight Key Night is an hour long event organised by Neil Sanderson, the creator of <u>NZ Net</u>. The event is held twice a year on the first Sunday in December from 9 PM and on the second Sunday in June from 8 PM. All transmissions are on the 80 metre band. Contacts must be CW-to-CW at a maximum transmitter power output of 100 watts.

As with SSB phono transmissions on Jock White Field Days, a certain amount of information is exchanged on Straight Key night. Neil suggests we transmit our intention to straight key with a direct 'SKN DE ZL1CALL' rather than calling CQ. When a station replies with their call sign, we send some or all of the following info – RST/location/name/key/transmitter/power. RST refers to readability, strength and tone information. I don't know where my straight key comes from so I will leave out that part. To portray all this more clearly, I have created a 'cheat sheet' below of what I expect to happen in one of my Straight Key Night contacts. AR means 'end of message' and is sent with no space. K means 'handing transmission over'. It is common for operators to use N as a 'cut number' or abbreviation for 9 as Joe does on this cheat sheet when he sends me a signal report of 57N. Joe also uses 'cut number' T for zero in his description of his power as 1TT (100).

Last June I listened to Straight Key Night but as my Morse receive speed was less than 8 words per minute, I felt dismay upon seeing the speed of most operators and the way the exchange information was sandwiched between slashes so closely it was impossible to copy. This year, I can handle faster copy speeds and when I send I will take care to go at a speed I can handle and trust that some stations make the choice to match the speed I have sent to them. My cheat sheet will help.
